We were thrilled to be part of the kick-off event for our town's 250th Anniversary, and hope that you will all avail yourselves of the upcoming events planned by the town's 250th committee. I know that a banquet dinner is planned during the month of April—let's get some Stone House tables together and celebrate our town's big birthday.

During the winter months we will continue to carry out our plans for a new furnace and air conditioner in the Stone House. We will be proceeding with these projects now that we have been advised that the Community Preservation funds have been made available. Thanks to the newly rebuilt back steps and insulated pipes in the kitchen we have not yet had any frozen pipes this year, in spite of the early very cold weather. Thanks to **Pete Stebbins** and **Tony Trifone** for their excellent work. Also, we have been undertaking some long-needed repairs and improvements to the Tremaine House and Barn, including a new roof for both. **Robert Hislop** has been spearheading those projects, and this work will be continuing in the Spring.

Other exciting projects underway relate to the redecoration of the Museum interior and re-designing the exhibit room with a 250th Anniversary theme in time for Opening Day. Much work remains to be done this winter and spring. And speaking of winter and spring, it is not too early to mark your calendar for two upcoming fun fundraising events. First, our sixth annual Mystery **Dinner Theater** will

be held on our (now) traditional date of the First Saturday in February (Feb. 5th). We are very excited that our actors from last year will be returning again: actors will be organized by **Todd Farnsworth** and the fees we usually pay the actors will serve as a fundraiser for the Congregational Church. Tickets are now available, and we hope for a good turnout again this year, as this fundraiser helps get us through the dark dreary months of winter. The ticket price will be \$35.00 (\$4 less than last year!) and includes dinner and the show at the Villa Rose in Ludlow.

Second, we will again this year have a **Bus Trip to the Boston Flower Show** and historic Quincy Market. This trip usually sells out quickly, so try to get your reservations in quickly. 
















Great Memento of Belchertown's 250th Anni-

Cat's Meow figures of the Belchertown Historical Association's stage coach are now available at Rannsaka (115 North Main Street) and Swift River Crafts (51 South Main Street - on the common) for \$15.00.



Typical of stage coaches that ran through Belchertown in the 19th Century, this coach was built in Concord New Hampshire in 1869, and purchased by the Belchertown Historical Association in 1929. The coach is now housed at the Ford Annex on the grounds of the Stone House Museum.

NEW GARDENS AT STONE HOUSE

You have all seen and admired the beautiful memory garden at the Stone House. In 2010, an herb garden was started opposite the memory garden. **Peg and Lew Louraine** researched medicinal and culinary herbs of the nineteenth century and planted more than 20 types, mainly culinary, that would have appeared in the normal nineteenth century kitchen garden. In 2011, the garden will be expanded to include an

asparagus patch, red currant bushes, and many of those vegetables that would also have graced the homemaker's garden.

The soil was turned this Fall to prepare the beds and Sturbridge Village farmers have graciously shared their seed lists, so that appropriate varieties of squash, beets, onions, and other vegetables can be started. As they ripen, crops will be available to be viewed on Saturdays at the Stone House in the summer of 2011. Peg and Lew will be on site each Saturday and will be



delighted to answer questions and share their experiences, as they bring to life a tradition from our past.
