## LIVING HISTORY DAYS: Bringing the House to Life ~ Saturday October 4th ~ Harvest and Fall Activities in 19th Century New England

The Belchertown Historical Association is proud to again offer Living History Days on Saturday, October 4th. For this year's Living History event we are pleased to promote interest in Belchertown's History by combining our Living History Day with a special focus on archaeology in town, in honor of October, which is archaeology month.

Live reënactors, many dressed in period costumes, will demonstrate and discuss many of the Fall and Harvest activities that might have occupied residents of a house such as the Stone House in 19th century New England. We plan to present demonstrations and lecture topics that will include Herb Gardening; Historic Farm Implements; Preserving Herbs, Vegetables and Fruits; Soap Making; Candle Making; Outdoor Cooking; Spinning; Weaving; Corn Cob Dolls; Knitting; Broom Making; Quilting; Quilling; and other seasonal activities.



The Stone House will be open with a display of our nineteenth century farm equipment, our re-creation 19th century garden and house tours from 10 to 3. In addition, we will also present displays of the results of in-town archeological excavations and provide age-appropriate archaeological activities for children. **The Living History event will be a lot of fun, as well as a much-needed fundraiser. Please join us to celebrate this continuing link with our past.**

If you've been to the Stone House recently, I hope you've noticed the beautiful new gate that leads to our new Goshen Stone walk, both of which have been installed with a bequest from the Eleanor Schmidt fund—money that can only be used for the upkeep of the museum. When the stone walkway was installed last year, it was moved farther away from the house to avoid snow falling from the roof onto the walkway and blocking the entrance. The old gate did not line up with the new opening at the sidewalk. Fitzgerald Fence of Northampton came and installed our new gate last month. It is a double gate, to accommodate the wider stones. A special thanks to **Becki Smith** for getting it painted so quickly. This gate greatly improves the look of our museum, and, more importantly, accessibility to the walk throughout the year.



We are busy planning for our annual presence at the BELCHERTOWN HISTORIC DISTRICT COMMISSION BOOTH at the Belchertown Fair where we will present a photo display from the archives from fairs gone by. We will offer the traditional "straws" game and sell raffle tickets and gift items. Many thanks to **Becki Smith** for the painted decorations for the booth! And although the Stage Coach will not be in the Parade this year, Cat's Meow figures of the Stagecoach are still for sale at the Stone House.

October is a busy time this year, and we invite all to come to our October activities, which include our annual "Living History Days" (See separate article), a lecture October 16th on "Belchertown's Boys in Blue" at the Stonehouse, and our planned Halloween Cemetery Tours, on Sunday October 26 in the Mt. ## FRAGMENTS OF HISTORY

### The Past Comes to the Surface

October is Archaeology Month! This year's Living History Days (October 4th 10am—3pm) will include a display of some significant dated examples of early life in Belchertown found on the dig site of the Lauren Shumway Homestead (c. 1840) on South Main Street. Examples to be on display range from a variety of period ceramics, potteries, and porcelains to wrought iron strap hinges and sleigh parts. There is a black powder gun hammer, clay tavern pipes, buttons, buckles, jewelry pieces, sleigh bells, and even a few Native American artifacts found on the site.



Artifacts

Children will be able to try their hand at archaeological digging during a mock dig, digging for actual shards found at the Loren Shumway dig site, which can be traded in for a toy. Homeowner, **Lindsay Hoadley**, will be on hand to discuss the excitement of digging for history in your own back yard!
