In Memoriam

Doris Mae (Hawkins) Dickinson

March 15, 1925 – February 20, 2015

Regarding the passing of Doris Dickinson there is only too little or too much to say; we could devote the entire newsletter to her and say too little, and if we recited the many good works she did, there would be too much to include here.

I cannot write of Doris without personal emotions being present; my earliest memories of her are what would now impersonally be called "daycare" or "babysitting". While my mother, who Sarah

(her daughter) referred to as "your Doris" (my mother, a Math professor at UMASS) was at work, she ("my Doris") sometimes trusted Doris Dickinson to care for me and her same-aged daughter, Sarah. It was not a small or insignificant charge, as any working mother knows, but clearly I was in good hands. Doris Dickinson was my pre-school teacher, and her daughter (Sarah) was in my kindergarten class and we both walked about 20 feet behind the "graduates" in our little robes; we were two little chipmunks at the end of the line: we both had mumps!

Regarding her work for the Stone House—she did just about everything, at one time or another. If a job needed doing, she stepped in and did it, from buildings and grounds to painstaking research for special projects. In her later years she loved the documents and the archives, which the Trustees named in her honor when she moved; they are now the "Doris Dickinson Archives" at the Stone House Museum. Her enduring dedication to our Association, and her love for our town's history and our museum have been an inspiration to me for as long as I can remember; through her tireless perseverance and diligence she left a lasting legacy that will endure for generations. Since her passing, every stone of the house and grounds and every picket of the fence seem to want to tell of some positive contribution she effected. We mourn her passing and remember and celebrate the difference she made in all our lives.

The last I can say is that she did many good works in the different areas of the community that she was involved in, and really made a tangible, lasting, positive difference in the world around her. She will be sorely missed.

We would like to thank all who supported our seventh annual Murder Mystery Dinner in January. Instead of hiring actors from outside of town, the Historical Association again entered into an agreement with BUCC'S PLAYHOUSE, from the Belchertown Congregational Church, so the dinner theater served as a fundraiser for both the Historical Association and the Congregational Church. The actors performed Paula Hilton's "DEATH BY VALENTINE", a high-energy comedy/mystery. Someone was murdered (or course) and bedlam ensued, resulting in an evening of entertainment that delighted the audience. More than 100 people came to the Villa Rose to support this much-needed fundraiser. The food was wonderful, the staff was very attentive and, of course, the actors from BUCC's Playhouse did a wonderful job. Everyone seemed to have a great time, so many thanks to the actors from BUCC's Playhouse, the management and staff of the Grapevine Grille, and all who attended this fun, mid-winter event.

Report from the Museum Committee

The Museum Committee has been very busy! **We have been sponsoring a Lecture Series open to the public at the Stone House.** The purpose is to promote interest in and provide information on Belchertown's history. October 16: "Boys in Blue" —Belchertown's Civil War soldiers by Cliff McCarthy. It traced the soldiers' lives from enlistment to "mustering out".

November 13: "World War I: The Home Front" by Randi Shenkman, a poster series of recruitment and the sacrifices made by ordinary citizens.

December 11: "Something of the Character Within" by Elizabeth Peirce and Sheila Damkoehler. Portraits of Swift River Valley children of the 19th and early 20th Centuries with discussion of clothes, poses, backdrops, and props.

January 29: "The Rescue of Angeline Palmer" by Cliff McCarthy. In 1840 a plan was made to sell Angeline, a ten year old free orphan, into slavery. She was saved by members of Amherst's Black community.

March 19: "Talking with the Dead in Massachusetts" by Rob Cox. The focus was on the American Spiritualism movement of the 1850's, its people and their beliefs, and activities in western Massachusetts.

April 26: "One Hundred Years of Sentinel History" by Peter Dearnness. This will be presented at the annual meeting at the Masonic Lodge at 3:30 and is open to the public. We invite all to come.

In addition to sponsoring a lecture series, the Committee has been reporting to the Trustees on the condition of the Stone House and making recommendations for upkeep and repairs. The new flagstone path has been installed and the gate moved. The railing on the front steps has been repaired. Plans for the immediate future include replacement of slate roof tiles and restoration of the fallen ceiling in the storage room.

Cliff McCarthy, archivist, and committee members have been cataloging new acquisitions and inventorying our extensive collection of period clothing. We appreciate all donations of artifacts and request that people dropping them off include their name, phone number, and/or e-mail. We like to acknowledge such gifts and obtain background information to catalog them properly

Update from Tom Stockton, BHA President

I haven't seen a Robin yet, but what a busy and event-filled winter it has been! The Stone House is truly a busy place, filled with momentum and activity in all aspects of our mission and it is exciting to be part of such a vibrant organization! A lot has been happening with regards to the maintenance and preservation of our Museum, our finances, and of course, the social life of the Association, and we pause to look back on all the important work members of the Association have been doing during the long winter months and consider the current state of our Association.

After the Fair we sponsored our annual fall Living History Days. For this year's Living History Days event we provided another activity relevant to Belchertown's history, with the theme: Bringing the House to Life ~ Harvest and Fall Activities in the 19th century New England Home. Live reënactors, many dressed in period costumes, demonstrated and discussed many of the fall and harvest activities that might have occupied residents of a house such as the Stone House in 19th century New England. Demonstrations and Lecture topics included Herb Gardening; Historic Farm Implements; Local Archaeology (thank you **Lindsay Hoadley!**); Preserving Herbs, Vegetables and Fruits; Candle Making; Outdoor Cooking; Spinning; Weaving; Corn Cob Dolls; and other seasonal activities. The Stone House was open with a display of our nineteenth century farm equipment, our re-creation 19th century garden and house tours from 10 to 2. This was a truly wonderful event: it was interesting, informative, entertaining, and very pertinent to our mission. We wish to thank our Sponsors **Easthampton Savings Bank, Bell & Hudson Insurance, Country Bank for Savings, Florence Savings Bank, and McCarthy's Pub—and all the volunteers who worked so hard to make this such a success.** We appreciate everyone's support, and hope more families will note the first Saturday in October 2015, for a new installment of this quality event. Following our Living History Event, it was time for our annual Yuletide Event, and many kudos are due to **Sally Shattuck, Denise Smith, Maureen Austin, Carol Mierzewski, Gerri Amprino, Becki Smith, Millie Harrington, Darren Chevalier** (for the wonderfully successful "Outhouse Raffle") and **the whole committee** for bringing off this event so beautifully. Our many elegant baskets, wreaths, and traditional crafts were the talk of the town and all who attended.

Much work has been done during the winter months by the **Museum and Membership Committees**—these volunteers have worked tirelessly in their respective areas

to make sure that the museum will be on a firm footing for the coming season. The Museum Committee's lecture series, in particular, was very well-received and provided an opportunity to hear lectures on many fascinating topics. In the Stone House we are still working on implementing our Community Preservation grant addressing certain structural issues inside the museum, and we have now moved the gate to match our new Goshen Stone walk when the ground has thawed. We are very grateful for the income from the **Edward & Eleanor Schmidt Trust** that has enabled us to complete this project. We have also gotten a new de-humidifier for the cellar, and are working on getting an on-demand hot water heater for the bathroom and kitchen. We are planning on a full report at our Annual Meeting, on April 26.

Of course, we have made time for a little fun this winter too, and **thanks to our Fundraising Committee** a wonderful time was had at the Ninth Annual February Dinner Theater held at the Villa Rose in Ludlow, with the actors from **BUCC's Playhouse**.

This is a great time to be involved in local history, and the trustees and museum committee have been involved in too many projects to fully mention here. We hope that this year will see an increase in attendance at the museum—and please don't forget that we are always looking for cleaners, dusters, house-sitters and docents during the summer months. As spring progresses we begin to look forward to our traditional springtime activities at the Stone House. We are hoping for a good turn-out at our Annual Meeting on April 26th. **Shumway Family
Correspondence
Comes to the
Stone House**

In December 2014, the Belchertown Historical Association acquired more than one hundred letters and other family material related to the Shumway & Works families of Belchertown. Delivered to the Stone House by owner John Schumacher-Hardy, these letters were mostly written to, and collected by, Mary (Works) Shumway. Though Mary and her husband George F. Shumway were both Belchertown natives, they were living in Monson during the time covered by most of the correspondence, roughly 1880-1910. George Shumway was the son of Loren and Harriet (Foster) Shumway. Mary was the daughter of John and Laura B. (Thresher) Works.

In addition to the letters, there is a large amount of genealogical material related to the Shumway, Works, Pratt, Coolidge, and Alden families. Anyone wishing to review these items, should make arrangements to visit the Stone House archives by contacting Cliff McCarthy at: camcca@charter.net

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
