

The Belchertown Historical Association

The Belchertown Historical Association was informally organized in the 1890s to preserve and study the history of the town. The association was formally established in 1903 and used the town library to house artifacts and books. The acquisition of the Stone House enabled the association to open in 1922 as a museum to house all its own artifacts. The museum is supported by membership dues, admission fees, investment income, and fundraising activities. The historical association and museum are governed by a Board of Trustees elected by the membership.

Annual Association Meeting—April 27

Opening Day at the Museum—May 10



The Stone House Museum is scheduled to open for the 2025 season on Saturday, May 10th. This annual event showcases the museum and special exhibits and reveals the history and creativity of Belchertown, past and present.

Activities from 9am to 2pm offer shopping opportunities, including a plant sale with both annuals and perennials, a tag sale, and our legendary Old Bag Sale. Tours of

the Stone House Museum (free to all), the Memorial Garden, and the Demonstration Garden are also provided throughout the family-friendly day.





Museum Hours: May-October Saturdays 2-5

Admission is FREE for members (Form on page 37) Non-members: \$5 adults, \$4 seniors, \$2 children.

The museum is also open for special tours and group tours by appointment all year.

The Stone House Museum

The museum, located at 20 Maple Street near the center of town, is owned and operated by the Belchertown Historical Association. The Federal style home was built in 1827 by **Jonathan Dwight** as a wedding present for his daughter, Julia Diantha. The house remained in the Dwight family throughout the 19th century. By the early 20th century, there weren't any more Dwights in Belchertown to live in the house. One of the relatives contacted the Belchertown Historical Association to see whether it might be interested in acquiring the house and property to maintain as an historical museum. Fortunately, BHA gave her an enthusiastic yes. She then donated the money to them to purchase the house.



Taking care of the house has been the primary condition of that gift. As such, recently the dining room and best parlor have been repapered with historically correct paper. The downstairs hall and the upstairs hall have been repainted.

On the upper floor is our special exhibit of the Revolutionary War as we commemorate the 250th anniversary starting with the battles of Lexington and Concord on April 19, 2025

The Stone House property includes three buildings which were not here during the Dwight's time: the Ford Annex, the Sentinel building and the Washington District School.



The Washington District School

Washington District School, the last intact one-room school-house in Belchertown, was acquired in 2016 by the Belchertown Historical Association through a donation from Andrey Korchevsky of Bell Properties. We believe it well worth our efforts to preserve this building; it will be a vital link in telling our story. We continue to need help




with fundraising, as none of us is an expert in this. We are so grateful for the more than 100 people who have contributed to this project, but we still estimate that the whole project will cost about \$150,000 more than we have raised.

Work on the inside has started and the list of "to do's" is very long (and costly), but it includes: modern connections for Wi-Fi, installing heat and air conditioning, overhead lights, etc., insulating the building, refinishing the floors, building a staircase to the basement, enclosing the utility section of the room, setting up the coat area of the room; adding drywall and paint. With your help, this is becoming a reality!



The Sentinel Building

The Blackmer Building is where the Belchertown Sentinel newspaper was printed by Lewis Blackmer starting in 1915. In May 1968, the building and printing press were purchased at auction by **Peter Dearness** who then donated them to the historical society.





times. When possible, demonstrations of the press happen on Opening Day and Living History Day. There is also a proof press, which provides the last chance to proof read before printing, as well as ephemera related to the Sentinel and other artifacts.

The Ford Annex

Belchertown carriages were prized for their fine craftsmanship

both in this country and abroad. After visiting the Stone House to view its carriages, **Henry Ford** donated the funds to build this structure in memory of his associate, **Gaston Plantiff**, who was a Belchertown native. Ford was concerned that our world-renowned carriages were sitting





on the lawns exposed to the weather. In addition to the carriages made in Belchertown, the museum collection includes an 1869 Concord Stagecoach—which is similar to those that once passed through town on the way to Boston. Also on display is a hearse, sleighs and a wide selection of period machines, farm implements, spinning wheels, looms, a cobbler's bench and equipment, ice cutters, stoves, and even a bathtub.

The Museum Gardens

The Remembrance Garden was created in 2001 by volunteer Becki Smith to honor her parents, Mr. & Mrs. William Smith, and their love of nature. It has grown and expanded over the years to honor the memories of many special people. The garden can be found between the Sentinel



Building and the Ford Annex, and is beautiful to behold, home to lovely perennials and spring bulbs, with a background of rhododendrons. Benches were added so people could just sit and relax amidst the beautiful flowers and comforting shade.

We honor those who have gone before us. Our past is following in their footsteps. Our future is continuing their important work.

Research is done constantly
to be sure the seeds or plants
that are nourished in the plots
are appropriate for a progressive gardener of the time.

Some of the plants have been donated by Belchertown residents whose families have cherished them for generations!

Volunteers are in the garden regularly, and visitors are welcome to drop by, and may be invited to cut a few herbs to carry home with them and enjoy. Help is always welcome. The single shortcoming of the garden is that there is no "family" as such in residence to water or weed or shoo off the rabbits!







Doris Dickinson Archives



The Belchertown Historical Association has an archive in the Stone House Museum with over two hundred boxes of historical documents and records that provide a chronological history of Belchertown from its beginning in the early 1700s up to the present day. The acquisition of these materials began on the day the Association was formed in 1903

Included in the archives are: almanacs, diaries, and autograph books; public records

from businesses, community organizations, and churches; military records from the Civil War, World War I, and World War II; historical records from Town government, the Belchertown Fair & Cattle Show, and the Clapp Memorial Library; news clippings, speeches and pamphlets, post cards and greeting cards, photo albums and scrapbooks, maps, hotel registers, and more. Genealogical Database

Genealogical records of Belchertown families are used extensively by those tracing their family trees. Our database includes records on more than 17,000 people who have lived in Belchertown and their ancestors. In addition to the database, the archive holds letters, diaries, photos, manuscripts, newspapers, scrapbooks, published books, and other materials. Updates in the Museum



Exciting news from our Museum is the framing of our mid-19th century Map of Hampshire County, which is now on display in the entrance hall of the museum. The Map has hung for years in the hall with only flexible covering, but has a detail of the center of Belchertown and several towns which are now under the Quabbin. It is great that it

can now be touched and closely examined safely.

We continue to try to build our collection with important artifacts that will help us tell the story of Belchertown's past.

Already having in the exhibit room is this copy of one of the very few portraits ever painted of **Governor Jonathan Belcher**. It was donated to the museum.

The exhibit room on the upper floor during the 2024 season featured Belchertown Crossroads: travel by carriages, stagecoaches, trains, trollies and inter-city taxis and buses, 1800 - WWI.

Our 2025 special exhibit will feature events leading up to the 250th anniversary of the War of Independence



- the United States semi-quincentennial. The room will show-case Belchertown in the Colonial / pre-Revolutionary War period and then it will evolve into Belchertown during the Revolutionary War. This will be a multi-year exhibit.

Before named for Governor Belcher, in 1761, our town had different villages, each with their own name. The area closest to Amherst was called Dwight. The Dwight family was integral in the founding of our town. The village hosted 2 train stations, 2 schools, a post office, 3 cemeteries, small industries and much more.



Come and learn more about the area of Belchertown once known as Dwight. Last year's event was so popular we have brought it back and added new lectures, displays and music. This event is held on the grounds of Dwight Chapel. Watch for upcoming announcements in the local papers.
